



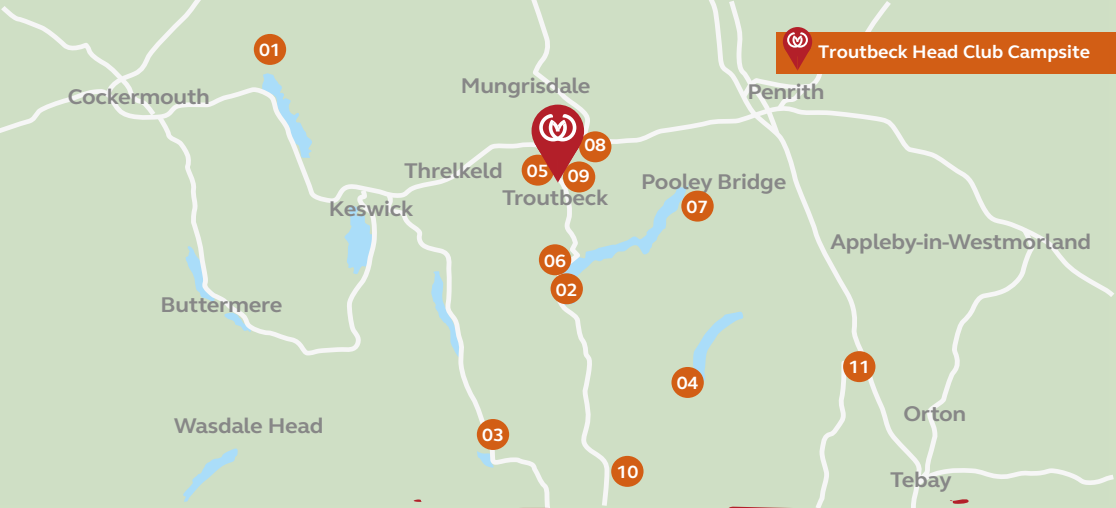

Visit

1 Lake District Wildlife Park

Wildlife park with over 100 species from antelopes to zebras.

2 Ullswater Steamers

Discover the myths of the 'Dark Lake' as you set sail through this spectacular valley.

3 The Wordsworth Museum & Art Gallery

150 acres of trees and memorials, planted as a living tribute to those who have served, died or suffered in the service of their country.

4 RSPB Haweswater

Pied flycatcher can be seen mid April to late June. Dipper, peregrines and redstart can be seen late April to August and if you are lucky you may catch sight of red deer and red squirrels.

5 Rookin House Farm

Enjoy a full range of activities including quad bike tours, clay pigeon shooting, archery, go karting and fishing.

6 Sailing, Powerboating and Kayaking

Explore the waters of Lake District with a friendly, professional guide and a picnic on route.

7 Pony Trekking

Panoramic views on horseback from Barton Fell overlooking Lake Ullswater, suitable for age 5+.



Cycle

There are cycle routes within one mile of the site and also mountain bike hire and routes nearby.

The nearest National Cycle Network route is route 71 C2C which is 1.5 miles from site.

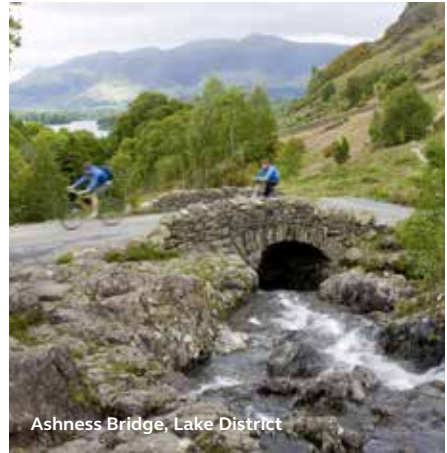
Walk

9 Local routes

There's an excellent new footpath around Ullswater and a dog walk from site on forest tracks to the village of Dockray, where you can visit the Royal Inn for a spot of lunch or a drink.

10 Troutbeck

A quaint and picturesque village home to Troutbeck Park Farm, where Beatrix Potter once resided. Gain a unique look into the life of a Lake District family at historic Townsend House.

11 Penrith

This hidden gem lies in the heart of Cumbria, and offers a plethora of boutique shops, cosy cafés, bakeries, beautiful streets, markets and historic sights, including a castle.



Visitor's top tips

Our favourite place to visit was Buttermere, absolutely stunning!

Keswick is a really dog-friendly town!

Visit Cocklakes farm shop, it's excellent for BBQ food.

Take binoculars and a bird feeder – visiting woodpeckers are a delight and there are owls nearby too.

Daisy's Café in Ambleside serves excellent food at great prices.

The Beacon Museum in Whitehaven was fantastic and very interesting.

The fish & chips from the local van that visits site were very good.

We spotted lots of toads and wildlife on the lower road near the stream.

The National Trust's Aira Force Waterfall is absolutely stunning, plus it is dog-friendly and makes a lovely walk at any time of the year.

We definitely recommend a visit to Gretna Green, which also has a great shopping outlet village.

The Troutbeck Inn was excellent, and served a delicious Sunday Roast.

Visit the English Heritage's Hadrian's Wall, built by the Romans and stretching for 300 miles!
